Great Leaders Make Adjustments at the Drop of a Pin! (Some Insights and Analogies)

So often when I played sports, our set plays would break-down and fall apart at the drop of a pin. Whenever that happened we only had a few seconds at the most to make adjustments so that we'd score anyway. The same thing almost always happens during a Trial.

Likewise, Moses' plan, after the Lord told him to go get His people out of bondage, was to confront Pharaoh with the directive and be off to the "Promised" land; "Piece of cake", right! Problem was, however, that Pharaoh wouldn't budge in the beginning. So Moses had to "regroup" and come up with a whole new plan so the mission would succeed anyway. And, with God's help, he did. And the new strategy worked brilliantly!

How often in business and practice do we have to do the exact same thing (cases take an unexpected twist, clients decide to take ill-advised actions that complicate everything, etc.).

The same holds true in the Public Interest sector for law and government. The two disciplines can make for some very "stressed alliances". Government funding for Public Interest programs & projects, for example, generally doesn't allow for quick adjustments, or for the ebs & flows of an imperfect clientele. They want their programs carried out exactly as they're set out on paper, whether doing so makes any sense or not. Their focus is generally on the numbers. Performance, as it relates to changing lives & policies, is secondary to them.

That's why I don't pursue government funding with the same fervor I do private initiatives. Plus I simply don't like being told what to do by people who are bent on living out an idealistic existence in an imperfect world. Such people have no conception of what it really takes to make a great initiative work at the grass-roots level. I'd much rather seek-out unrestricted funds, develop our own areas of expertise, and let the market determine whether we get it right, regardless of the sacrifices!

Most people simply can't deal with this level of sacrifice and commitment, and that's understandable. But I want the ones who can on my team! I've seen you go through a lot of things over the last few years, and gotten to know you as well, and I really believe you're a "dream" partner!
